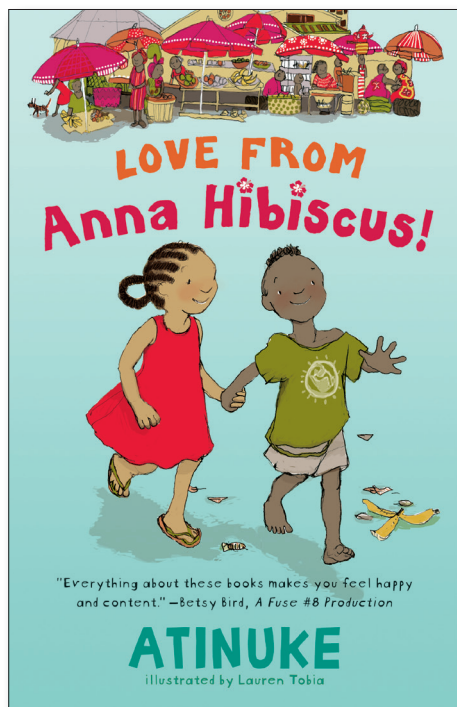


In the penultimate book in the series,

- What does each person do in the village? How do all the different jobs contribute to the community?
- Grandmother makes the older girls change their clothing and hairstyles before going to the market. Do you agree with this decision?
- Why is it significant that Anna Hibiscus decides to teach the village children how to read?
- Anna can be described as an activist, or someone who notices a problem and creates a solution to try to solve it. Based on what the children of the village tell her, what problem does Anna want to solve? How does she work with others to make changes?
- Why does Anna change what she thinks about Sunny Belafonte once she learns his story? What actions does she take to apologize and make right what she has done to him? What does she learn from this experience?

  
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
